

Brit loses religious discrimination case

LONDON -- A British Airways worker banned from wearing a small cross on a necklace has lost her case claiming religious discrimination. Nadia Eweida, 56, of London, a check-in worker, claimed discrimination because other faiths were allowed to wear symbols, including Muslim hijabs and Sikh bangles, London's *The Independent* said. The airline later changed its policy to allow employees to wear religious symbols. Eweida then lost her discrimination case before a British tribunal, the paper said. "I'm very disappointed," she told the newspaper.
