

## Sisters Folk Festival announces 2008 winter concert series

SISTERS, Ore. – The Sisters Folk Festival presents the next two concerts in the 2008 Winter Concert Series. David Lindley will perform on February 10 and Tracy Grammer on March 2 at the beautiful Five Pine Lodge and Conference Center in Sisters.

On February 10, multi-instrumentalist David Lindley will perform music that redefines the word "eclectic." Lindley, well known for his many years as the featured accompanist with Jackson Browne, and leader of his own band El Rayo-X, has long championed the concept of world music. The David Lindley electro-acoustic performance effortlessly combines American folk, blues, and bluegrass traditions with elements from African, Arabic, Asian, Celtic, Malagasy, and Turkish musical sources. Lindley incorporates an incredible array of stringed instruments including but not limited to Weissenborn Hawaiian lap steel guitar, Turkish saz and chumbus, Middle Eastern oud, and Irish bouzouki. The eye-poppingly clad "Mr. Dave's" uncanny vocal mimicry and demented sense of humor make his onstage banter a highlight of the show.

On March 2, Tracy Grammer will perform in Sisters while currently touring in support of *Flower of Avalon*, her much anticipated solo debut. In January 2006, the album showed up on "Best of" lists and listener polls around the country, and was the #1 most-played album on folk radio across the United States. Grammer first graced the stages of the Sisters Folk Festival with long time partner Dave Carter, and demonstrated why Dave and Tracy went on to international acclaim with their beautiful melodies and inquisitively poetic lyrics. Tracy Grammer tours internationally with songwriter and multi-instrumentalist Jim Henry. With acoustic and electric guitars, beautifully matched voices, dobro, mandolin and violin, this duo shares original songs, instrumentals, and pays homage to Carter and other stellar writers while charting a brand new course for themselves in the musical landscape. Grammer says, "I'll keep on singing, and I'll keep on telling my story, however that evolves. Working with Dave Carter was the first step on what I hope is going to be a long and fruitful road for me: the endless quest for authenticity through music."

The Campbell Brothers were the first in the series and surpassed all expectations. The crowd was dancing throughout the evening. "We couldn't be happier with the turnout and the show," said Events Director, Katy Yoder. "The audience left the concert walking two feet off the ground; it was incredible." The next two concerts should be top quality as well; both David Lindley and Tracy Grammer are fantastic performers bringing their own style of music to Central Oregon.
