Her first starring role in a series was in CBS's "Love & Money." Other credits include indie films and the series "Huff" and "Andy Richter Controls the Universe." Paget, who is single, says she loved "Criminal Minds" even before joining the cast. "I'm obsessed with serial killers -- it's probably the only reason I got the job," she jokes. DEAR STACY: I have a bet with a co-worker regarding Tommy Rettig, who was on "Lassie." She says he died of a drug overdose as a young adult.
