Itineraries in Alaska, the Pacific Northwest, Mexico's Sea of Cortes, Panama, Costa Rica, Asia and the South Pacific give guests the opportunity for a wide range of culturally enriching journeys. Photo CDs of the cruises are available onboard, and the profits are given to causes in the area of the cruise - for Columbia and Snake River cruises in the Pacific Northwest profits go to assist the children of migrant workers with their educational needs through the Union Gospel Mission; for Alaska cruises profits go to an intern program for whale research in Petersburg; and for South Pacific cruises medical and educational supplies are purchased and delivered to various islands such as Tikopia.
